17. Which of the following two statements comes closer to your view about the time and a half overtime pay proposal for salaried workers in Michigan making up to 47,000 per year? **[READ AND ROTATE STATEMENTS BELOW]**

The incomes of middle class families have been stagnant for the past 20 years. This proposal will enable 275,000 Michigan workers to earn overtime pay when they work more than 40 hours a week. If workers are going to be asked to work that many hours, they should be paid for their work.

Or

This proposal will hurt small businesses and kill jobs, and could also cause a serious decline in Michigan’s economy. If it costs employers more than they can pay for time and a half overtime pay, many are likely to either reduce jobs or make many workers part-timers.
